# Coastline Housing SECR Statement 2022/23



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# Background

Coastline Housing have requested a Streamlined Energy and Carbon Reporting (SECR) statement to comply with the latest SECR Regulations (2019). This report presents a full  $3^{rd}$  party verified SECR statement, compared to the previous financial year's usage, for use in Coastline Housing's annual reporting. All emissions throughout this report are displayed in terms of carbon dioxide equivalents (CO<sub>2</sub>e) and have been rounded to 2 decimal places.

Coastline Housing is an independent Cornish charitable housing association providing over 5,000 homes. They are responsible for ensuring their residents live in homes that are of a good quality and well maintained.

# **SECR Regulations**

Defra guidance to the regulations state that "large unquoted companies and large Limited Liability Partnerships (LLPs) are obliged to report their UK energy use and associated greenhouse gas emissions as a minimum relating to gas, electricity and transport fuel, as well as an intensity ratio and information relating to energy efficiency action, through their annual reports".

The Department of Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) confirmed that Housing Associations will fall within the SECR qualifying categories, if the Group includes companies, even if they are a not-for-profit or they are undertaking public activities.

This is a useful exercise as it enables Coastline Housing to identify where carbon savings have been made upon last year's figures and where environmental performance has decreased, highlighting areas to focus on in the future.

The UK Government's Environmental Reporting Guidelines state that unquoted companies and LLPs in scope of their legislation are required to disclose energy and carbon information in their accounts and reports, including:

- UK energy use (minimum of purchased electricity, gas and transport)
- Associated greenhouse gas emissions
- At least one intensity ratio
- Previous year's figures for energy use and GHG emissions (except in the first year)
- Information about energy efficiency action taken in the organisation's financial year
- Methodologies used in calculations

Therefore, all of this information is reported in the SECR statement below. This statement shows energy use and carbon emissions for the 2022/23 financial year.



# **SECR Statement**

The following information is to be reported in either the Directors' Report or, in the case of charitable companies, the reporting should be in the combined Directors' and Trustees' Annual Report. It is assumed that Coastline Housing will produce one financial report relating to all (if applicable) subsidiaries it owns.

GHG emissions and energy use data for the 2022/23 financial year (April 1st 2022 – 31st March 2023):

- No other energy purchased or used other than UK and offshore i.e., no global energy
- Previous usage is required for this year of reporting

# Energy efficiency action statement

During the 22/23 financial year Coastline continued to invest in lower carbon and more efficient heating sources and systems;

- 26 gas boiler only replacements
- 27 full gas heating systems installed
- 1 x air source heat pump replacement
- 5 x air source heat pump systems installed
- 7 x oil boiler replacements
- 1 x oil heating system installation
- 37 x electrical (Quantum) heating systems installed





# Summary of Emissions

As well as providing emissions in a complete SECR format, we report emissions separately in terms of Scope to enable Coastline Housing to understand the sources of the emissions and to better suit social landlords. The tables below show the total emissions from Scope 1, 2 and 3 sources as well as a breakdown of emissions within the Scopes. # **Appendices**

## 1. Notes on SECR statement

#### Gas data

- This data was provided and excel spreadsheet titled "Copy of 1. Broker Template COMPLETE.xlsx" which was uploaded via Q4.1 of the SHIFT portal.
- 2022 Defra conversion factor used (0.18254 kgCO₂e per kWh (Gross CV) natural gas supplied by the UK grid)

## **Electricity**

- This data was provided and excel spreadsheet titled "Copy of 1. Broker Template COMPLETE.xlsx" which was uploaded via Q4.1 of the SHIFT portal.
- 2022 Defra conversion factor used (0.19338 kgCO<sub>2</sub>e per kWh UK electricity)
- 2022 Defra conversion factor for T&D losses (0.01769 kgCO<sub>2</sub>e per kWh UK electricity)

## Transport fuel – business mileage

- Business mileage in employee-owned vehicles over the 2022/23 financial year was provided in the form of a spreadsheet uploaded to Q4.2 of the SHIFT portal titled "SHIFT Mileage Calculations 2022-2023.xlsx".
- Defra 2022 conversion for "average unknown car" is 0.27465 kgCO<sub>2</sub>e / mile driven by the average car.

## Transport fuel – maintenance fleet

- Coastline Housing's Head of Innovation, Maintenance and Group Procurement uploaded 'Fuel Usage Report 2022 to 2023.xlsx' via Q6.1 of the SHIFT portal.
- Defra 2022 conversion for "Diesel (average biofuel blend)" is 2.4115 kgCO₂e / litre
- Defra 2022 conversion for "Petrol (average biofuel blend)" is 2.4156 kgCO₂e / litre

## Intensity

The intensity ration chosen for Coastline's SECR reporting is number of homes managed as this is appropriate business metric. The Asset Database & Programme Supervisor reported a total of 4,629 homes managed. These are the homes for which Coastline Housing have Decent Homes responsibilities for – including General Needs and supported living.

An additional intensity ratio chosen is the kg  $CO_2e$  /  $m^2$  office space. An energy performance certificate was obtained for Coastline Housings office which indicated the total floor area to be 492  $m^2$ .

## **Homes managed**

Coastline have chosen to voluntarily report their regulated emissions from the homes they manage as these far outweigh operational emissions. For many properties Coastline provided 3<sup>rd</sup> party estimated carbon emissions for their independently heated homes from Parity. Where these were not available, SHIFT methodology used average SAP rating and heating type data to estimate the kg CO<sub>2</sub> are emitted per individually heated home managed from regulated emissions. In total, it is estimated that 10,355.77 tonnes CO<sub>2</sub> are emitted from Coastlines independently heated homes.





# 2. Reporting in Scopes

Scope 1, Scope 2 and Scope 3 carbon reporting come from the GHG Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard and are adopted by the UK Government in the Environmental Reporting Guidelines.

### Scope 1:

- Direct emissions from controlled or owned sources, which includes those from combustion of fuel and operation facility.
- This includes emissions from activities owned or controlled by the organisation that release emissions into the atmosphere.
- For a housing association this will include emissions from gas used at offices, from fuel used in company pool cars, from fuel used by the in-house maintenance fleet, by any gas or other fuels used in communal areas and communal heating systems owned/managed by the organisation (even if this is recharged to residents), as well as potentially any fuels bought by the organisation itself for use at construction sites.

## Scope 2:

- Indirect energy emissions from the generation of purchased electricity.
- These include emissions released into the atmosphere associated with your consumption of purchased electricity, heat, steam and cooling. These are a consequence of the organisation's activities, but the emissions do not occur at sources you own or control.
- For social landlords, this will include electricity bought for offices, community hubs, depots and for communal areas (even if recharged to residents).

### Scope 3:

- This relates to emissions that are a consequence of the organisation's business/actions, which occur at sources you do not control.
- It is not a requirement to report on emissions associated with inputs into your company (e.g., from the supply chain) or linked with outputs from your company (i.e. emissions from your products when they're used by customers). In a social landlord's case this may relate to products bought for the construction and maintenance of homes as well as the emissions from homes when they are occupied by residents.
- Government Environmental Reporting Guidance states you should consider reporting these separately to give a wider picture of your organisation to investors and shareholders and where these expose the reporting company to material risks, opportunities, or financial impacts.
- For social landlords this would include business mileage that occurs in employee-owned vehicles. Other examples include public transport travel, transmission and distribution losses associated with UK electricity, contracted maintenance fleet emissions etc.
- We would include emissions from lead assets (housing stock) as a voluntary scope 3 emission although we do advise all our clients to report the regulated emissions from their housing stock, as your core product.
